

World Week this year. After watching Planet Earth 2 and seeing the devastating impact single use plastic has on our world, oceans and people, we have been keen to make a difference! We

investigated 'how long until it's gone?' and discussed the meaning of decomposing materials, explaining

where items that are not recycled end up. We were shocked to see single use plastic bottles are used once but take up to 450 years to decompose! So all of the plastic ever made that has not been recycled is still out there in a landfill, and will not decompose for another 350 years.





Thanks to the incredibly generous donations of the school community, every single child in the school was able to make a T-shirt Bag for Life to help reduce the number of plastic bags in the world. We decorated them with powerful messages to show our support of reducing single use plastics. We also discussed the impact cling film has on the world, and made lots of promises to reduce our use of cling film. #### Class 5

Class 5 have had a fantastic year. We have been looking at climate change and the goal for

The competition was for 20 local schools and judged by Tim Peake himself. Well, I am absolutely delighted to say that the children were mightily impressive and not only did they impress us with their contribution but they only went and won the

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




whole competition! We received a wonderful trophy and £500 for our school. Our children's catapult fired an impressive 8.9m and the children presented their design


beautifully to the judges. Tim Peake was very impressed!
