Well done to all those children who are reading daily. Miss Harrold regularly updates our class Star Reader board. We now have many more free readers which is fantastic. Keep it up! Miss Harrold will continue to check reading records daily.

Times Tables

We have a number of children who have already reached the dizzy heights of Level 10 Cracking Times Tables – wow! This involves 100 mixed questions from a range of tables in 3 minutes. Good luck!

Below is a breakdown of the CTT levels and the number of children on each level, so you can gauge how your child is doing. Children in Year 3 need to know the 2, 3, 4, 5, 8 & 10 times tables.

As you can see over half the class are working on or above Level 6 which is fantastic, particularly as we are moving on to learning how to multiply and divide using short multiplication short division and firm grasp of the times tables will help enormously.

Y3 Spelling Rules

Please note: Spellings may not be set in this order but these rules will be covered during the year. In addition, some rules from KS1 are revisited such as verbs ending in *ing*

- Use the prefixes un-, dis-, mis-, re-, pre-.
- Add suffixes beginning with vowel letters to words of more than one syllable e.g. forgetting, preferred, gardening, limited.
- Use the suffix -ly.
- Spell words with endings sounding like 'zh' and 'ch' e.g. treasure, measure, picture, nature.
- Spell words with endings which sound like 'zhun' e.g. division, decision.
- Spell the homophones brake/break, fair/fare, grate/great, groan/grown, here/hear, heel/heal/he'll, mail/male, main/mane, meet/meat, peace/piece, plain/plane.
- Spell words containing the 'i' sound spelt 'y' elsewhere than at the end of word *e.g. myth, gym*.
- Spell words containing the 'u' sound spelt 'ou' e.g. young, touch, double.
- Spell words with the 'k' sound spelt 'ch' e.g. scheme, school, echo.
- Spell words with the 'sh' sound spelt 'ch' e.g. chef, machine.
- Spell words with the 'ay' sound spelt 'ei', 'eigh' or 'ey' e.g. eight, they.
- Use the first two or three letters of a word to check its spelling in a dictionary.
