Sell vs Shopkeepers sell bananas and raise 13 million bananas each day. There are over 5,000 fairtrade products in the UK. There are over 2,000 fairtrade schools. All green and black chocolate are now fairtrade. 1.6 million farmers and workers are benefiting from fair trade. Fairtrade produce currently sold in 125 countries.

Our Home Learning challenges this term (Term 6) are linked to Awareness of our World and encourage the children to look into global issues, research them and find ways to help people all over the world. Bessie chose to research Fair Trade and where chocolate comes from. She wrote a Haiku poem linked to chocolate and Fair Trade and I am blown away by how thoughtful and heartfelt her poem is.



As part of Fair Trade week this year, Class 5 played a game called the Christian Aid Paper Bag game which is based on

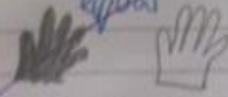
the lives of paper bag makers in Kolkata. In the game you had to work with your group pretending to be a family making paper bags out of newspaper. Unfortunately, this game was not designed to be fair; in fact it was designed to be unfair. You then had to sell your paper bags to a bag distributor. The distributor could change the number of bags you had to make, the size of bags and their shape to suit their needs. This meant that it was very hard for the families to make enough money to live on even though they worked very hard. The whole class really enjoyed the game and it helped everybody to understand how people can become stuck in a vicious cycle of poverty. Have a look at some of our views on the game.



We then looked at a Fair Trade lesson where we had to sort belongings and supplies into needs and wants for people. We were surprised by what things we classified as want items. We discussed how the world's poorest people often do not earn enough to buy the things needed for all their basic needs e.g. nutritious food, clean water, medication and education. This made us think about how we would want the world to be. We ended up writing our

own list of Human Rights - things we felt everybody in the world should have access too. I think we did a pretty good job with this!

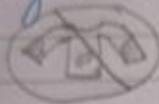

We try to include as many people as possible and make sure our lovely cocoa farmers get \$10.00 a day for their hard work done in the farms. We ensure all our workers get a good amount of money so at the end of the day, everyone is happy.

We at cocoa chocolate farm our cocoa beans using no chemicals. Our forest friendly farmers are starting to plant their cocoa beans more spread out; in order to form more beans. Diseased or sick plants, which can not be used for our delicious chocolate, are buried in holes to stop the disease spreading.

In order to save our rainforest we at cocoa chocolate make sure we are not expanding our farmland onto the rainforest; we are totally forest friendly!

Fair trade is helping us to expand our thriving company. They also ensure that our

FOREST FRIENDLY CHOCOLATE FAIR COCOA!

FAIRTRADE

Fairtrade is an organisation that gives everyone a living wage.

Fairtrade farms produce chocolates, bananas, papayas, wool, oranges and lots more. It was created because, in some parts of the world, people are not paid fairly and are trapped in the vicious circle.

FARMING SUSTAINABLY

Ngo leagorbu farmers do not use pesticides or chemicals; they are 100% organic. They bury diseased pods so the disease don't spread to other trees. They plant trees further apart which helps trees gather more nutrients. This is a method used by Ngo leagorbu farmers.



WORKING TOGETHER

In Ngo leagorbu cocoa farm in Sierra Leone, West Africa, cocoa farmers work on one ^{person's} section of the farm on one day, another person's the next day. They have bought their own scales: they know that they are being paid fairly. They hold meetings to decide what to spend extra money on.

PROTECTING THE RAIN FOREST

Farmers scare away chimpanzees by hitting drums. They don't farm in the rainforest or cut down trees in the rainforest.

FOREST FRIENDLY CHOCOLATE

working together they sell to the fair-trade group they bought a set of scales so everyone knew the price and work on everyone's farm to make more money.

Farming sustainably is what the people are doing; by looking after ~~own~~ the rainforest they do this by farming organically to not cause diseases. They also have learnt planting trees further apart means they will get more.

The coco farmers, who are helping our planet, know how to treat plants with disease.

They also don't catch the fish in the rainforest instead they catch the ones outside. They also don't hunt the animals that live in the rain-forest. They have also put coco farms around the rainforest so animals can meet one another.



FOREST FRIENDLY CHOCOLATE

Farming Sustainably

Fairtrade farmers, which get paid better than regular farmers, farm their coco organically without any chemicals. If they find a diseased pod, they have learnt how to dispose of them. They also plant their trees further apart so they can grow stronger!

Protecting the rainforest

Now, with the help of Fairtrade, farmers don't farm in the forest: they NEVER chop trees down. Monkeys used to have to be killed. Now, they make noises to make them find a different source of food.

Working Together

Coco farmers work with each other and sell to Fair-Trade. Some even buy their own scales so they know how much money they deserve for their hard work;

Coco farmers work on each others farms.

They do this to get the job done.



Fairtrade

With fairtrade, farmers such as coco farmers, banana farmers and coffee farmers get paid a fair amount for what they farmed. Without fairtrade, farmers in LEDCs (Less Economically Developed Countries) only earn £74p A DAY!
