
read by Mrs. Crowley but we also had the chance to share books with our parents.

together to cycle widths of the playground. In total we cycled 464m!








The first two terms in Class 1 have been a whirlwind! Making the change from EYFS to Year 1 has been met with enthusiasm and determination – both qualities that have been shown again and again in Class 1. Learning new routines, new expectations and above all getting to grips with lessons in all the National Curriculum subjects has been a positive experience with children being inspired to further their learning at home.





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In Science we have been learning about the human body; in particular the five senses. Smelling different foods with blindfolds on and tasting different foods was great fun. Lemons and vinegar were both either loved or hated! We have been testing and describing

materials according to different properties. As I write we are planning to test a variety of materials for absorbency.

In DT we created moving pictures using pop up techniques that we had seen in storybooks. We enabled a character or object to move up and down or side to side.

Over the term Class 1 have enjoyed their Yoga sessions, the visit from the Life Education team, our Quidditch experience, Forest school, our celebrations in Church and of course our Nativity. Our term was finished off with our fantastic performance with Year 2 of 'Simply the Nativity'

which gave us all the chance to shine so brightly especially those crazy party sheep!



Forest School


Class 2 have loved their Forest School sessions as they have been so varied. So far, we have investigated what type of birds visit our local area. We made dens and used our bird spotting charts to see who came to see us. We invited our families in to make bird feeders with us. We have had a visit from James an ecologist from Lower Mill. James showed us a beaver skin, some duck skulls and bones and some owl pellets. We can't wait for his return visit!





Nativity

We could not be prouder of the children's performance in the nativity. It was just wonderful to see their confidence shine through and it seems we have some budding actors in the making. They learnt their lines, songs and stage directions in a very short amount of time. Well done Class 2!



Class 2 have produced some amazing pieces of writing since starting in September. We looked at the book Wild by Emily Hughes and the children thoroughly enjoyed working out her story. As you can see their work was just incredible, here is a missing poster created to find 'the girl. Keep it up Class 2, this is just amazing!



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Year 3

DT Collars

Class 3 made Ancient Egyptian collars in our DT lessons. This linked with our History topic and the class showed great perseverance and creativity when creating their collars. Stand out moments include making wood whistles and creating Christmas wreaths from willow and dogwood found on our school playground. Our last forest school lesson this term will be linked to our Science topic of rocks, investigating rocks found on the school site.

Open the Book

Class 3 have had a few opportunities to take part in Open the Book assemblies, which happen every Friday. The children are always eager to take part and enjoy performing Bible stories to the rest of the school.

Quidditch

Class 3 thoroughly enjoyed taking part in our Quidditch day. With one child from Class 3 winning the best chaser award, out of the whole school. The children worked well in their teams and showed lots of support to one another, in order to gain as many points as possible. The children even enjoyed chasing me for some bonus points...!

Yoga

We have been lucky enough to have Miss Jackson come back into school to provide Yoga sessions for each class to enjoy. My class particularly enjoyed catching up with her, as their previous teacher. They listened really closely and followed instructions well to provide a peaceful and calm environment, which they all enjoyed.

Year 4



Year 4 have had such a fantastic start to the year, with many fun activities already under their belts: their LifeBase visit, Quidditch (I know!), their (phenomenal) class assembly and even a residential trip to Viney Hill.



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









Year 5 What a busy term Year 5 have had! We have been reading Shackleton's Journey as our class book and using it as a starting point in English. Shackleton's Journey looks at the real-life story of Shackleton and his crew onboard the Endurance in their 1914-1917 mission to Antarctica. Things didn't go according to plan and the Endurance- after months of battling the ice- was finally defeated by the elements and sank. Shackleton- along with his crew- then embarked on a mission to reach Elephant Island several hundred miles away before sailing over 800 miles in a lifeboat to South Georgia. We were inspired by this journey and the subsequent discovery of Endurance to write scene descriptions.







We were so inspired by the British Antarctic Science Research station – Halley VII and its design that we created our own versions thinking about the features it would need to keep scientists safe and occupied as they carry out their research.

We have also been learning all about Space and our wonderful solar system. We have carried out scientific model activities on the school field where we have looked at how far the planets would be from each other based on scaled model. We couldn't believe how far out the gas giants were from the rocky planets especially Neptune! No wonder it takes so long to orbit the sun!



We loved sharing our ideas in our class assembly where we had a chance to show off our singing skills with the song from the Christian Aid about justice called Speak up! We were proud of our knowledge and enjoyed roles of the different planets in the solar system.



Year 6

Class 6 have been working incredibly hard this term. In English, we have been reading the novel *Floodland* by Marcus Sedgwick. This is a story set in a dystopian world where global warming has caused the sea to rise until cities are turning into islands and civilization is crumbling. The city of Norwich has been consumed by flooding and new islands have appeared and ten-year-old Zoe has been left behind on Norwich by accident when her parents escaped in the last supply ship to visit the island. Zoe discovers a small rowboat and keeps it a secret until she can set out alone on the great sea to find her parents. She lands on tiny Eels Island, where she must survive in a nightmarish world run by wild children and their boy-leader, Dooby. Luckily, Zoe and a boy called Munchkin escape and

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cross the sea to the mainland, to find not only Zoe's parents but a new family and a new world. We have been busy writing diary entries, newspaper reports and really focusing on our editing skills this half term. We have even written our own dystopian novels as a possible sequel to Floodland. We have been using a variety of nunctuation and sentence types to keep the reader engaged


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

initiatives such as electric cars and solar panels.



Attendance - IMPORTANT -another reminder with start of a new year ahead


